

Grace and peace to you,


What a beautiful fall we've enjoyed – the colors on the trees are outstanding this year. On a recent walk the familiar crunch of leaves beneath my feet brought a smile to my face. I pray you have ample opportunities to go outside and enjoy the crisp autumn air, misty mornings and stunning hues of the sunset against Mt Si. There is much to be thankful for as we enter November.

As always life is full and busy around the church. You may have noticed, through your time with visiting pastors from our cluster and invitation to "cluster wide" events, that our partnership with local Lutheran congregations is growing and evolving. Over the last two years we've increased our engagement within the cluster including hosting the Tiny House Build, attending and hosting family game nights, going on the Belize Mission Trip and more. Alongside the events, leadership from cluster congregations have been meeting to dream and discern how we can more effectively work together on the administration/business side of church life – what could work and what simply doesn't given geographic locations and acknowledgment of keeping independence where needed.

In the last couple of months these conversations have grown more frequent and more concrete. Draft proposals were crafted with a particular focus on the three Bellevue congregations, but with an invitation for Mt Si and other cluster churches to participate. Mt Si Council Leadership is discerning how we might be involved in the proposed plans. Please expect information and Q&A sessions over the next 4 months as the process moves forward. Please know that Council has no intention of making decisions on behalf of Mt Si without your input and involvement. More specifics will be shared at our **Annual Meeting on November 24**.

One area of shared ministry that is working is in children, youth and family (CYF) ministry. Right now, CYF leadership from Mt Si, Sammamish Hills, St. Andrew's, St. Luke's, Our Savior, Holy Spirit & Faith Lutheran Churches meet monthly to plan monthly CYF events, annual retreats, game nights, collaborative VBS & more. We are calling ourselves the **Eastside Lutheran Fellowship (ELF).** We still do individual events that make sense to keep "in-house." However, there is a lot we can do together that wouldn't be possible on our own. In particular, I'm looking forward to taking several of our youth


Sunday Intergenerational Study Hour


event. It takes many hands to provide this event free of change to our community each year. What a joy!

St Clare's Episcopal is planning a community prayer and Compline service just before the election, and building a temporary labyrinth for people to walk while they pray. Please join in prayer on November 3 from 5:30-6:30pm.

Dear Beloveds.

As the election season is here – and for many, your vote has already been cast – I have been doing some reflecting on what it means to vote as a Lutheran Christian. Please know that I am not telling you who to vote for in this election. It is not for me to tell you who to vote for. I mean, after all, God is neither Republican or Democrat, or even American.

But in saying that, I am not abdicating the responsibility that we have as Lutheran Christians who live in a country where voting matters. As children of God, we are called to vote beyond our own self-interest or individuality. As people who follow Jesus, we are called towards God's vision of a just and mercy-filled world. As people who have received grace upon grace, we are called to stand against injustice, and to remind everyone that, in God's eyes, every single person is loved and beloved.

So, here are a few thoughts and questions:

1. Jesus is all about loving one's neighbor. Even when it is hard. When he is asked, "Who is my neighbor," Jesus expands his answer beyond imagination. In Jesus' stories and actions he constantly goes to those who are on the outside, those marginalized, those without status, and shows how they are loved by God – how they are, in fact, his neighbor.

As you vote: Who is your neighbor?

2. Throughout scripture, hospitality to the stranger is embraced. In the Old Testament, the command to welcome strangers is repeated 37 times. In Matthew 25:35 Jesus says, "I was a stranger and you welcomed me."

As you vote: Who is the stranger?

3. God's will and God's calling is towards equity and justice for those who have been silenced, oppressed, or harmed. As we hear in Isaiah, "Learn to do good; seek justice, rescue the oppressed, defend the orphan, and plead for the widow."

As you vote: Who are the silenced, the oppressed, the harmed?

4. The eighth commandment declares that we are called to not bear false witness against our neighbor. This, of course, means not lying about another. This means no name-calling or false accusations. But it goes beyond this. As Martin Luther tells us in his Small Catechism, we are to defend our neighbor, speak well of our neighbor, and explain everything in the kindest way.

As you vote: Who is speaking truth?

5. God created this beautiful earth and declared that we are both part of the creation and are also called to be stewards. As we read in the ELCA social statement, Caring for Creation: Vision, Hope, and Justice, we affirm that it is God's intention for the healing and wholeness of creation.

As you vote: Who is caring for creation?

Dear Beloveds of God, there is so much more that could be written about the state of the country and what voting means. We could make this all complicated and intricate and difficult. (And to be fair, the United States sometimes feels shaky and unmoored). But truly it comes down to this: God's love is unconditional and unending. Jesus came to this earth to show, to embody, to be God's love for us and for all people. And so, knowing this, trusting this, believing this, we are called. We are called, as baptized and sent children of God, to show this love to the world. We are called to vote against hate. We are called to vote for God's love. As we hear in 1 John, There is no fear in love, but perfect love casts out fear ... We love because God first loved us.
