

#### **Conversions**

So, Ananias went and entered the house (on Straight Street.) He laid his hands on Saul, and said, "Brother Saul, the Lord Jesus, who appeared to you on your way here, has sent me to you so that you may regain your sight and be filled with the Holy Spirit." (Acts 9:17)

Last June I attended Seattle's Greenwood Car Show. Cars were backed in and lined up on both sides of the street all along Greenwood, from 70th to near 90th Street. It was a beautiful morning and there were lots and lots of us checking out classic cars, hot rods, and custom cars.

There was a perfectly restored 1931 Packard, a whole lot of Tri-Five Chevrolets (1955-57) and a number of Fords. There were vendors selling t-shirts, youngsters sitting at lemonade and cookie stands, and a few clubs hosting special interest booths. One of them was the Hell's Angels.

When I first saw the Hells Angel's merch booth, I did a double-take. The Hells Angels? Are they rebranding themselves? Known as an outlaw motorcycle club dating from the late 1940s, The Hells Angels Motorcycle Club has been prosecuted over the years for a variety of crimes including illegal firearms sales, distribution of heroin, cocaine and marijuana, and murder.

I walked up to the booth and introduced myself to Jed. (I didn't get his partner's name.)

I told Jed I had a question I wanted to ask him. He said, "Buy three t-shirts and you can ask me three questions!" I laughed and then he said, "Go ahead, fire away."

I said, "I grew up in Los Angeles. Before I had ever heard of the Hells Angels, there was a motorcycle club called Satan's Slaves. Have you ever heard of the Satan's Slaves?" Jed said he had. "Really! What happened to them?" Jed said he didn't think they were around much anymore. "Some of them converted to Hells Angels." I said, "They converted? You mean like a religious conversion!?" This exchange was followed by some awkward laughter.

Jed's partner took up the slack and asked me, "So what brought you up here to Washington?" I told them that I was a Lutheran pastor and had been invited serve a church in Issaquah in 1992. Jed then said that he thought maybe his grandparents were Lutheran. I thanked them for their time and moved on. Over the course of the next several days, I kept thinking about our conversation and conversions. I was baptized in a Baptist church when I was eight years old. Going forward to accept Jesus as my personal Lord and Savior one Sunday night in June of 1955 was, for my Baptist pastor, my conversion.



My favorite conversion story is the conversion of Saul (aka St. Paul) who "was breathing threats and murder against the disciples of the Lord" while on the road to Damascus. According to Acts 9, Saul was blinded by the light of Christ and brought by his traveling companions to Damascus, where he sat in a house on Straight Street for three days fasting.

The Lord deployed the disciple Ananias to lay hands on Saul "so that he might regain his sight," whereupon Ananias also baptized Saul and he was filled with the Holy Spirit. "After taking some food he regained his strength." Not long thereafter Saul began to proclaim Jesus in the synagogues in Damascus saying, "He is the Son of God."



Lutherans don't talk as much about conversions as Baptists do but we believe in it just the same. In my mind, Martin Luther's explanation of

the daily meaning of Holy Baptism is about the gift and grace of daily conversion. Luther writes: Baptism signifies that the old person in us with all sins and evil desires is to be drowned through daily sorrow for sin and repentance, and that daily a new person is to come forth and rise up to live before God in righteousness and purity forever.

Out of curiosity I googled "Hells Angels Conversions Stories," and I found a March 2024 story from the *Enterprise Ledger*, (Enterprise, Alabama,) about Lester Grout, a former member of the Hells Angels who "converted to Christianity and now ministers to the very gangs he used to ride with."

A former Marine sniper, Mr. Grout joined the Hells Angels and became an "enforcer" whose job was to "hurt people." While attending his grandfather's funeral in Fort Walton Beach, Florida, the youth pastor remembered Lester from his teenage years and invited him back to church. "Eventually Mr. Grout turned his life over to Christ and left the Hells Angels." For the last twelve years, Mr. Grout has ridden with a group of bikers who visit outlaw motorcycle camps and talk to them about God and Christ.

My conversions have not been as dramatic as Saul/Paul's or Lester Grout's. Maybe yours haven't been either. Still, the daily gift of our baptism is a way to renew our lives in Christ for loving service to God and others. In his Letter to the Romans, St. Paul (aka Saul) writes about the transforming power of baptism: Do you not know that all of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? Therefore we have been buried with him by baptism into death, so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, so we too might walk in newness of life. (Romans 6:3-4)

#### North Bend Farmer's Market Every Thursday through September 12



Martin Luther writes in the Small Catechism:

What then does 'daily bread' mean? Everything included in the necessities and nourishment for our bodies, such as food, drink, clothing, shoes, house, farm, field, livestock, money, property, an upright spouse, upright children, upright members of the household, upright and faithful rulers, good government, good weather, peace, health, decency, honor, good friends, faithful neighbors, and the like. (Small Catechism, Fourth Petition of the Lord's Prayer)



In May, the six bishops of Region One (this includes the synods of Northwest Washington, Southwestern Washington, Alaska, Oregon, Northwest Intermountain, and Montana) were asked by the Region One hunger teams to write a joint letter requesting Congress to re-authorize the federal Farm Bill and to not cut important funding. The six bishops agreed to write this letter. After it was written and signed, the ELCA Advocacy staff in Washington, DC hand-delivered it to the House and Senate Agriculture Committees' leaderships and to the Representatives in each of the synod's respective states.

In June, there was a zoom event for all the Lutherans in the six synods to learn more about the Farm Bill and advocate for its continuation. This event was sponsored by the Region One hunger ministry teams, ELCA Advocacy, and Faith Action Network (FAN). Different speakers shared information, conversation happened, and the opportunity to write letters to legislators occurred.

As you might know, the six synods have over 560 congregations and tens of thousands of Lutherans from the states of Alaska, Idaho, Montana, Oregon, Washington, and Wyoming. These synods and states are not homogenous. The bishops are not homogenous. The congregations within each synod are not homogenous. The members of these congregations are not homogenous. We have differences of opinion at times, we have different priorities, we vote differently, we even shake our heads at things that don't make sense to us about one another.

And yet, in our diversity, we are also joined in the unity of Christ and the promises we have received. Deep in our bones, we know that we are saved by grace through faith. We hold fast to the truth that God loves us no matter what. We know this and trust this and hold this. And, because of this, together we are called out into the world - as followers of Jesus and as civic members of society.

We join together - over and over - to bring about change and protect the vulnerable. We come together beyond political difference because of what we have been promised and what we are called to do and to be. The example I've been using in this article is the Farm Bill. When we advocate for this bi-partisan Farm Bill, we are advocating for farmers, migrants, agricultural workers, Indigenous peoples, hungry children, the inclusion of those who have been historically excluded, and more.

But, of course, we come together far beyond this Farm Bill. We come together because God calls us to love others as God loves us. We work together for a just society. As German pastor and theologian Dietrich Bonhoeffer wrote, "Mere waiting and looking on is not Christian behavior. Christians are called to compassion and action, not in the first place by their own sufferings, but by the sufferings of their brothers and sisters, for whose sake Christ suffered." (A Testament to Freedom)

I am thankful and proud to be Lutheran because of all of you who feed and clothe, nourish and shelter, love and protect those who are the most vulnerable in this country and this world. It would take pages to list all the ways that you do this individually, in your congregations, in the synod, and in the wider church. Thank you for your advocacy and your care. There is, of course, more work to be done. And so let us together work towards the day when all may receive "daily bread."
