Grace and peace to you,

We now find ourselves in the season of Lent—this year, during our mid-week Soup, Study and Worship we are exploring Isaiah 55:1-13. The text describes in detail God's great invitation to all people to, "come to the waters." The passage explores how God gives gifts, "without price," and invites us to self-reflection, humility and joy. In the passage the "trees of the field clap their hands" as we hear the truth that God's Word will accomplish all its sets out to do—and what is God's word in this text you might ask? Here are the first few verses to get us started:

1 Hear, everyone who thirsts;

- come to the waters;
- and you who have no money, come, buy and eat!
- Come, buy wine and milk
- without money and without price.
- 2 Why do you spend your money for that which is not bread and your earnings for that which does not satisfy?
- Listen carefully to me, and eat what is good, and delight yourselves in rich food.
- 3 Incline your ear, and come to me;
- listen, so that you may live.
- I will make with you an everlasting covenant, my steadfast, sure love for David.

If you are planning to participate in mid-week offerings or you are unable to I invite you to spend time with the full passage each week. Here are some ways you can do a self study with the text.

- 1. Spend one time reading through the full text and look closely at the questions the text asks. How would you answer these questions?
- 2. Spend one time looking at the imperatives in the text "hear, "come," "listen," "seek" etc. These words indicate that we should pay attention to what is said next—what is God saying through these imperatives?
- 3. Spend one time looking at the images in the text such as water, wine, milk, rain, snow, mountains or trees. How do these help you understand the text? In what ways do they make it more confusing?
- 4. Spend one time looking at what God promises to do in the text. What actions are we asked to take? How might you take time to follow through on these asks or how do you already take time?

There are many ways you can approach this text and many methods of studying it please feel free to approach it in a way that works best for you. If you are here on a Sunday morning and can stay for fellowship hour there will be opportunities to fill out a prayerful refection and post it on the bulletin board in the Fellowship Hall (details provided on the table below the bulletin board).

Most importantly, I pray you find the space you seek this Lent to rest deeply in God's embrace. If this is Sunday morning, Wednesday night or study on your own time that's all good—and so is just taking a nap!

Be well dear beloved of God—if you are thirsty, hungry, tired, overwhelmed, unsure—know that God is there to provide everything you need—without price. Thanks be to God!

COUNCIL REPORT

Greetings from your council.

As I mentioned in last month's article, at our annual meeting in January we had hoped to vote on changes to our constitution but did not have a quorum. We discussed this at our council meeting and decided that we will wait until our congregational meeting in November to vote on the changes. We thought we will have better luck drawing a quorum for that meeting than if we tried to hold a meeting just to vote on one item.

Our three teams that are working towards our goals that we developed from the discernment process will be using a four phased approach. In the first phase we will decide on goals and which agencies and organizations we will approach. In the second phase we will contact potential partners and develop a scope of work which we will share with the congregation. In the third phase we will implement our plan and ask for the congregation to help. In the fourth phase we will evaluate our activities, make changes as necessary, and put together a plan of action for next year. Watch for opportunities to participate as we move through this process.

We have been approached by a person who is looking for a place to establish a small day care. They are trained and licensed to operate such a facility. They would pay us rent and pay for a building inspection and any alterations we may need to make. They would have their own liability insurance. The day care would be for ten children and would operate Monday through Friday each week. The preschool would use two classrooms upstairs, which will require some rearranging of current items, and will leave two large and one smaller classroom open for our use. Council approved going through with the inspection and make our final decision following the outcome of the inspection.

We still have a council vacancy that we would like to fill. We meet the second Tuesday of the month at 7:00 pm. If you are interested, let Pastor Krista or a council member know.



WORSHIP NEWS-LENT SEASON


What is the season of Lent all about?

The term "Lent" originally comes from the Anglo-Saxon word "lencten" which means "spring." This is the time, in the Northern Hemisphere, when the days are lengthening. The season began as period of fasting leading up to the Vigil of Easter. Catechumens, those preparing for baptism at Easter, would fast and spend days in intense preparation. For those that were already baptized, Lent was a period to be renewed in their faith by studying the Bible, the Creed and the Lord's Prayer.



Although it was originally only a two-day period of preparation, Lent became a three -week preparatory period in the middle of the fourth century and then this was further expanded into six-weeks, or forty days. By the end of the fifth century, there was a desire to exclude Sundays from Lent since Sundays are always celebrated as feasts of the Resurrection. Thus Lent begins not on Sunday, but on Ash Wednesday.

The current practice of forty days of Lent recall Jesus' forty-day fast in the wilderness after his Baptism (Matthew 4:2, Luke 4:1-2) as well as Moses' forty-day fast on Mount Sinai (Exodus 34:28).

BISHOP'S LETTER

March 2023



The 10-year-old girl at the school we were visiting was asked, "When was the last time you went to the beach?" She paused, thought, and finally said rather quietly, "I think when I was three."

This might not seem like a huge deal. Many people choose to not visit bodies of water. But you see, this little girl is a Lutheran Palestinian attending one of our Lutheran School in the West Bank. She is fluent in English. She is warm and engaging. She has dreams and aspirations. Her family is dedicated to her education, and they are faithful Christians. And she cannot get to the water that historically was her people's

land because of checkpoints and government policies. She is literally a few miles from the water that she cannot swim in.

In January, seventeen ELCA Bishops traveled to the Holy Land on a "Living Stones" listening tour. Bishop Azur of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land (ELCJHL) invited us to come and see the Lutheran Church in the Holy Land and for us to witness firsthand how the Lutheran Church is positively impacting thousands of people.

On this tour we didn't have time to visit many "holy sites." Instead, this was a working trip that was designed to meet with those who are living in the Holy Land today – or as Palestinians say – to meet with the Living Stones of the Holy Land. During our time with our siblings in Christ, we learned and listened; prayed and contemplated; laughed and wept. These beautiful and courageous people welcomed us into their lives with grace and dignity. We were given an abundance of food, gifts, laughter, worship, and dancing.

And the stories. The stories were rich and beautiful ... and devastating. Like so many people throughout history whose lives have been ripped apart by oppressive powers, the Palestinian Christians have had their land, their identity, and their freedoms radically diminished. In some cases, completely erased.

Excerpts of stories I heard:

- The men whose family homes have been demolished because they cannot produce paperwork from the Ottoman Empire that their family has owned their land for over a century.
- The fourteen-year-old boy who was killed in a refugee camp. In his pocket was a piece of paper where he had written his last will and testament. Many young people are now carrying wills in their pockets as they fear they will be killed.
- Concern that the Holy Land will become a museum rather than a living expression of the rich diversity of people who call this land their home.
- A principal at one of the Lutheran schools stating proudly: "We are educating the next creative leaders in Palestine and in the Middle East."

Truly a highlight of this trip was the ordination of Pastor Sally Azur. Pastor Sally is the first Palestinian woman pastor in the Holy Land. She is called to serve two Lutheran Churches in the Holy Land and we are excited to see her flourish.

We were able to visit with a Jewish human rights organization, the United States Ambassador for Palestinian Affairs, the Palestinian Authority Prime Minister, the General Secretary of the Lutheran World Federation, and many others who listened to our concerns and who also stated their deep dedication to working for peace and justice in this land.

I confess that what I have written here barely touches on the complexity of the situation in the Holy Land. Hundreds if not thousands of books have been written. I am no expert. But as I continue to reflect on this trip – and as I hope to plan a trip for this synod in the next year or so – I hold this verse in my heart from Isaiah, "Learn to do good; seek justice, rescue the oppressed, defend the orphan, plead for the widow." Isaiah 1:17

May we all learn, seek, rescue, defend and plead for all of God's beloved children. For the little girl who longs to see water. For the little boy whose life was cut short. For the men who want their family homes. For those who daily work for justice. For those who daily pray for peace. Oh God, we pray, Kyrie eleison.
