Grace and peace to you,

Beloved, the rain has returned to nourish the earth and show off every shade of grey sky you could dream of.

There is a part of me that can't wait to cozy into the fall and winter seasons - hot tea, warm blankets, fires in the fireplace, yummy soups, changing colors and the smell of wet leaves - yes, there is a part of me that doesn't mind cold and rain and endless gray. There is also a part of me that will soon long for warmth of the sun, cheerful flowers and fresh greens all around. In truth, this fall and winter season can be an honest mental challenge for many of us. We can feel lethargic, lonely or loose focus and interest in what is happening around us. This is not an unknown to us - you are probably well versed in what helps you get through the season - a sun lamp, some additional vitamins, taking extra time to be with others - If you haven't found what works for you - start asking your friends, doctors and others for guidance.

Recently, at our Thirsty for Theology gathering, I was reminded of an important practice that strengthens my well-being and strengthens our community. This practice is simple, but often overlooked. The practice is to celebrate - to share the positive experiences with each other. The practice is to share with one another those beautiful and powerful moments when we encounter God/Holy Spirit/Jesus during the week.

Sometimes, as Christians, we become more comfortable sharing our struggles, needs and concerns within a community we trust, than we can be at sharing God's awesome work in and through us. Sometimes, we spend our energy pointing out those things that aren't quite right, need to be fixed or should be changed and miss putting equal energy into pointing out those things that went really well, were fixed or were a blessing despite hiccups along the way.

It was noted at our gathering that we take time in worship to pray for others and ourselves, but we lack space to share joys and blessings - it is not that one is right and one is wrong - rather, we need both for a balanced and healthy community. We need to celebrate and give thanks to everyone in our community for being truly beautiful children of God. We also need space to be broken, share our struggles and be honest about ways we may need to change and rethink how we do things.

Scripture teaches us to be intentional about what we dwell on in our day. There is a reason for this - our hearts and heads need daily reminders that we are loved, forgiven and welcome in God's kingdom We also need daily reminders that God is still active and working for good all around us each and every day. Sometimes it can be nearly impossible to see without a community surrounding us and pointing it out.

No matter the season, I have seen the impact of taking time to celebrate in community and to honor God's work within a community. Perhaps, as we enter this fall and winter season we can find ways to celebrate together and make space to share what amazing work God is doing in our lives.

So I wonder, what would you celebrate in your own life? What would you celebrate within Mt Si Lutheran? What have you seen God doing in your life? What about the church? We are coming up on our 75th Anniversary next year as you think back on your time here at Mt Si what should we celebrate?



As you are able, I encourage you all to celebrate whenever and however often you can. I encourage you to look for God at work around you and, when it is hard to see, seek the encouragement of a brother or sister in Christ. We might be surprised a how much there is to celebrate!!

### **COUNCIL REPORT**

Greetings from your council.

Our income in August was \$12,084. Our expenditures for August were \$14,917. This is a loss of \$1,939. At the end of the month we had \$49,261 in our checking account.

We have been busy this summer with service to our community. We had a good year at the North Bend farmers market where we provided crafts for kids each week. We averaged 80 kids per week. Our high was 120 and our lowest was 25 on the one week it rained the whole time. In addition, we had a booth at the North Bend block party in July and had close to 200 kids show up for that. Our Garden of Giving was also successful providing fresh produce to the food bank. In August we participated with two other congregations to construct a tiny house to be used in one of the tiny house villages housing homeless in the greater Seattle area.

A reminder that we will be having our congregational meeting on November 12 following the service. Please put this on your calendar and make an effort to be there. We need a quorum to approve the 2024 budget and to approve changes to our constitution that we proposed in January. At the September council meeting we confirmed a voting membership list of 83 people. If you can't make it in person, you will be able to join on line. We will be sending out directions for connecting on line prior to the meeting.

Sheila Rodriguez will be coordinating the celebration of our 75 th anniversary celebration next year. We are working with the synod to set a date that the Bishop is available to be present. If you have any ideas, please share them with Sheila.

Looking forward to next year, we will have at least six vacancies to fill on the council. Our constitution currently requires that the council will consist of 12 to 16 members. We are considering a constitutional amendment that will reduce the number of council members required. This will be added to the amendments we will vote on at the November annual meeting. We will still need to fill vacancies for 2024. Please give consideration to joining us as we move forward in this time of change. The term is for three years with an option to continue for a second three years. We meet the second Tuesday of the month at 7:00 pm. If you are on council and decide that it is not working out, you have the option to resign.

# **Garden of Giving**

The Garden of Giving has had an incredibly productive year this year. It started in the Spring with our garden clean-up and the donation of a Thrivent Card which allowed us to purchase a bunch of vegetable starts. We also had vegetable starts from the Burnside's Greenhouse (thanks

Tom & Inge). The weather cooperated this year and we were able to start planting and harvesting a month earlier then last year, with our first harvest on 6/12 of 5 lbs of zucchini. The harvests took off from there with 10 weeks of over 30 lbs, including 2 weeks of more than 70 lbs, and we had a peak this year of 126 lbs of produce donated in one week. Our total for the year was 713 lbs of produce donated for the Snoqualmie Valley Foodbank. Thanks to everyone who has helped with the garden plots, either cleaning, planting, weeding, or harvesting. God is Good!



I'd also like to thank our God's Work Our Hands work party who added drip irrigation to the garden beds. We utilized a grant from the Northwest Washington Synod, ELCA to purchase the supplies and our great team did the assembly. The project will help us reduce

water waste and to continue to grow more vegetables for the Snoqualmie Valley Food

Bank. Our Team also dug potatoes, harvested other vegetables and cleaned out some of the garden beds.

# **BISHOP'S LETTER**

## October 2023



"Sometimes it's boring. Sometimes it's thrilling. Sometimes it makes me cry."

(Quote from "The Wonderful Ordinariness of Congregational Life" by Cheryl Fullerton, Christian Century, March 2022)

Recently I was thinking about church. (Full disclosure ... I think about church quite a bit.) But, in particular, I was thinking about the rhythm of church life. And I think the above quote from Cheryl Fullerton sums it up pretty nicely.

Sometimes it's boring.

I admit, sometimes there is something that is uninteresting about church. Perhaps it is the repetitive nature of it. Perhaps it is the cyclical nature of things. Perhaps it is seeing the same people in the same pew week after week and year after year.

We know that Fred will sing the hymns out of tune ... every time. We know that Mary will cluck her tongue at someone's tattoo peeking out from their sundress. We know that Mike will fall asleep during the sermon and we know that Dan will try to share the peace with every single person. We know that the children will fidget. We know that the baby might cry. We know that we have rituals and sacraments and prayers that we say each week. We know that sometimes we won't hear the utter preposterousness and absurdity and utterly amazing news that Jesus loves each of us and all of us – that sometimes this message sails over our heads because we're too busy looking at the bulletin.

And yet ...

### Sometimes it's thrilling.

I always get goosebumps when I hear the words, "I baptize you in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit." I rejoice each Easter when we all shout, "He is risen! He is risen indeed!" Candles lit in darkness bring hope and light on Christmas Eve. When I am privileged to place bread in people's hands and I see young, old, wrinkled, black, white, brown hands reaching out for Jesus, it is truly miraculous.

We know that Fred cares for his wife with Alzheimer's. We know that Mary still grieves her daughter. We know that Mike works the late shift and we know that Dan only leaves his group home for church. We know that the children will hear of Jesus. We know that the baby will grow up in the community of elders. We know that sometimes we will hear and understand, if even for a moment, the utter preposterousness and absurdity and utterly amazing news that Jesus loves each of us and all of us.

And so ...

### Sometimes it makes me cry.

Church is not for the faint-hearted. Church is not for people who only want to be with their own kind. Church is for the young, the middle-aged and the old. The healthy and the sick. The spiritually depleted and the spiritually full. Those who are seeking, those who are exhausted, and those who are filled with fire for justice. We all come together. The Freds and Marys and Mikes and Dans. And we sing and we pray and we receive Jesus, in community, together.

Church is wonderfully boring and thrilling. We catch glimpses of the divine amongst the coffee pot and petty disagreements. We see Mary hug the tattooed young girl after she is baptized. We see Mike exchange high fives with Dan. We see Fred with tears singing at the top of his lungs, "I Know that My Redeemer Lives."

There is nothing like church.
