Blessed New Year to you and to those you love! Welcome 2024, I can't wait to see what the Spirit has in mind for our faith community in the coming year. 2023 was certainly chalk full of incredible ministry and fellowship at Mt Si. We saw the expansion of our backpack/school supply ministry as other local social service agencies, such as Trail Youth and Feed Kiddos, stepped into support and collaborate. We saw another fun-filled season at the Si View Farmers Market hosting the free craft booth with over 60 kids a weeks stopped by. This ministry too saw and expansion with as we were invited to partner with a King County program to teach children about farmers, nutrition and cooking with produce. We continued our participation in outreach events like the North Bend Block Party, Holly Days and hosting the Harvest Carnival. Our quilters and prayer shawl knitters/crocheters provided warmth, prayer and comfort for countless people who received their lovingly crafted items. The prayer circle uplifted our community and the wider Christian community through their dedicated practice of prayer and fellowship. VBS once again drew children from around the community to hear about Jesus. Our family ministry expanded with cluster game nights, which have been a blast with 50 or more participating each month. The Men's Bible Study, Women's Bible Study, Thirsty for Theology, Mid-Week Study, Intergenerational Sunday Ed, Confirmation and more engaged young and old in deepening their relationship with God. Our financial leadership continues to serve the community well as they seek to use your gifts wisely to support all this ministry. Our building and grounds team has worked to provide safe, cozy, welcoming space for the expanding use of the building for internal and external groups. This year we welcomed two new AA groups, Mountain Valley Preschool, continued our work with the Red Cross as a blood drive host site, continued our work with the Girl Scout Leaders who meet monthly in our space, continued our ministry to offer space to families looking for a place to hold funerals for their loved ones who are not members of our church and so much more. Many individuals provide fellowship ministry through coffee hour, beautifully decorated spaces, caring for the changing of the altar clothes. Our continued partnership with the local cluster of ELCA Churches (St. Andrew's, St. Luke's, Sammamish Hills, Cross of Christ and Our Savior Lutheran) led to a beautiful joint outdoor worship service this summer, an upcoming mission trip to Belize in April, a summer mission opportunity for our middle and high school youth to build a Tiny Home, a youth retreat to Lutherwood and more.

I know I've missed things, there isn't space to list them all—I'd love to know what you loved most about the ministry of Mt Si in 2023. We have the second part of our annual meeting on January 28th after worship, I'd love for you to share those ministry memories. So much incredible, life-giving ministry took place in 2023. Let's give thanks to God! Know, that I am giving thanks to God for you—it was your presence, your dedication to this community of faith and

COUNCIL REPORT

Greetings from your council.

Our income in November was \$14,712. Our expenditures for November were \$13,353. This is a gain of \$1,360. At the end of the month we had \$43,200 in our checking account compared to \$63,605 at this time last year. Our net loss through the end of November this year is \$20,405

We were busy during advent. We had a good turnout for our advent festival on the first Sunday in advent. There were lots of treats and craft activities for all ages. On December 21 we had a youth and children Christmas party. At the end of the party we recorded the annual Christmas pageant which was played during the service Sunday service.

As we have done in the past we had a booth at the Holly days and tree lighting celebration in North Bend. We offered free hot chocolate and three different crafts for kids. We had over 100 kids drop in to do a craft.

On December 14 we hosted the Red Cross blood drive. Over twenty people donated blood. We will host this gain in March.

We will hold our year end congregational meeting on January 28.. At our November meeting we approved making changes to our constitution. Before those changes can go into effect we need to vote to ratify the changes that were made. We will need 40 members to make a quorum to ratify the changes. Once they are ratified we will only need %30 of the voting members to make a quorum. With our current membership of 83 the quorum will be 25 members. Please get this on your calendar and attend either in person or virtually.

At our December council meeting we elected a new executive team. Dave Spurling will be president for 2024 and Jack Boller will be secretary. We did not make a final selection for vice president. We will fill that position at our January meeting.

This year, Mount Si Lutheran Church will celebrate 75 years of Serving, Reaching Out, and Growing in Grace.


The date for the celebration will be Saturday, September 14, 2024

At the end of February 2020, Larry and Ann Thomas left their home in Issaguah, Washington, for a three-week vacation visiting family in Colorado and Texas. News of the coronavirus pandemic was slowly spreading. By the middle of March 2020 the world had changed and the global pandemic was in full swing. The Thomases decided to shelter in place in Flower Mound, Texas, for the next six weeks. On March 17, 2020, when Larry returned to his work as the interim pastor at Sammamish Hills Lutheran Church in Sammamish, Washington, it was from a makeshift office in Texas, not his office in Sammamish. Working remotely, Pastor Thomas began organizing

weekly virtual prayer gatherings and Bible studies. In order to connect with the congregation, he started writing pastoral letters as a way of reflecting on the intersection of faith, hope, and love while living through the pandemic. Lily Packed a Facemask is a chronicle of one pastor's commitment to engage with a congregation during the 2020 coronavirus pandemic. Grounded in biblical texts, Thomas takes the threads of a variety of writers and contemporary resources and weaves a tapestry of living life faithfully in the midst of a year of constant changes and challenges.

BISHOP'S LETTER

January 2024



I was listening to the news a few days ago when I heard that Israel had bombed Gaza using artificial intelligence called "The Gospel." I thought at first that I had misheard. Surely an AI program designed to bomb people is not named "gospel." But, horrifically, I had heard correctly. As Steve Inskeep from NPR's Morning Edition reports on December 14, "The system is called The Gospel. And basically, it takes an enormous quantity of surveillance data, crunches it all together and makes recommendations about where the military should strike."

Pause right here and read the above paragraph again. I mean it. Read it again.

A weapon of war is named The Gospel. Dear Beloveds of Christ, I cannot emphasize enough how bone-chilling and nauseous it makes me feel that a word designed to bring hope and love and peace and joy to this world – Gospel – is being used to kill.

I don't know who first named this system "gospel." I don't know what marketing expert or even what acronym "gospel" might mean in the AI world. I could not find the origin. But what I do know is that this system is now being used for something horrendous. This is so contrary to the first words from the gospel of Mark, "The beginning of the good news of Jesus Christ, the Son of God."

As you might be aware, the word gospel is translated into English as "good news." When Martin Luther was struggling about the laws of God and feeling that he was a sinner beyond redemption, he recounts in many of his writings how his understanding of God changed as he read Paul's letter to the Romans. He suddenly realized that it was not up to him, but up to God. God was the one who redeemed. God was the one who forgave. Luther suddenly experienced what God through Jesus does for all of us: Through Jesus Christ, God provides comfort for the terrified, forgiveness for the sinner, and faith for the doubting. Martin Luther was overwhelmed with God's grace and was immersed in the Gospel.

Following this earth-shattering understanding of the Good News of Jesus, Luther taught, preached and wrote about this insight every chance he got. In 1521, Philip Melanchthon condensed Luther's insight to this provocative sentence: "The gospel is a promise." To this day, Lutherans continue to bear witness to the whole church and world that the gospel is a promise, truly good news of God's mercy and love in Christ, received by faith alone.

In these days when words are manipulated by those in power, when evil seems to be gaining ground, when neighbor turns against neighbor, may we remember and experience God's grace. May we be enveloped in God's love. And, in response, may we, in our words and actions, move against the forces that are contrary to all that Jesus stands for.

For we are called, my dear Beloveds, through God's grace towards God's promise of wholeness and true peace. This is the Gospel.

As the prophet Isaiah proclaims of God in chapter 42, "I am the Lord, I have called you in righteousness, I have taken you by the hand and kept you; I have given you as a covenant to the people, a light to the nations, to open the eyes that are blind, to bring out the prisoners from the dungeon, from the prison those who sit in darkness.

May it be so. May it be so.

We look towards 2024 in faith, holding God's promise of Gospel.
