### What to Think About, When You're Down and Out

Think about these things. (Philippians 4:8)

My always important brother once told me that according to Jonathan Edwards we should never allow ourselves a thought we would not entertain on our deathbeds. ("What Are We Doing Here?" Essays by Marilynne Robinson)

On a morning after an evening that had gone a little sideways, I tried to get my bearings and center myself. One thing happened the previous afternoon, and then another thing happened that evening, and then, as I turned in for the night,

I realized I was mildly agitated and a little distressed about the things that had happened. I couldn't stop thinking about them.

The next morning, sitting on the couch, warmed by the fireplace, looking out the window at the early morning rain, I was *still* distressed and agitated. I tried to pray but I couldn't focus. I started reading/ praying a couple of psalms, but I was distracted. I couldn't stop thinking about the (little) things that had happened the day before. The thoughts were like a guerilla-fighters invading my new day.

Happily, my distractions were a catalyst for me to stop and think. I considered my options and decided to meditate on a couple of my favorite Bible passages: Philippians 4:8 and Luke 10:41-42.

Sitting in a prison cell, likely in Rome in 60-62 A.D., Paul wrote a letter to his sisters and brothers in Christ in Philippi. This thoughtful and loving letter includes a passage that has become a beacon, a guiding light for my life, if and when I remember it: *Whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is pleasing, whatever is commendable, if there is any excellence, if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things.* 

I wrote the passage out on a 4x6 card and then turned to Luke 10:41-42.

Jesus and his disciples presented themselves at the home of Mary and Martha for a meal. Upon entering their house, Mary sat down at the Lord's feet to listen to him, while Martha labored away in the kitchen, stewing over her sister's failure to help prepare the meal. Finally, Martha had had her fill of Mary lack of assistance, and asked Jesus to tell her sister to help. Jesus told Martha to relax, affirming Mary's decision to sit and listen to him.



Meditating on this text, I took some liberties with Luke 10:42 and Jesus' admonition to Martha: *Larry, Larry, you are worried and distracted by many things; there is need of only one thing, Mary has chosen the better part which will not be taken away from her.* 

Savoring the daily bread of God's word, I was able to center myself, and free myself from the distractions of the previous afternoon and evening. I turned my thoughts to some of the things Paul counseled his Philippian friends to think about: The gifts of the previous week visiting old friends in Wisconsin and Minnesota, a joyfilled concert Ann and I attended on Saturday evening in Seattle, an early morning phone call with a new friend in Florida, a video of a granddaughter running a relay, and singing a favorite hymn in Sunday worship.

I resolved to keep these two verses close at hand during the course of the day and when I was tempted to re-engage with the previous day's troubling thoughts, I took up the card with the verses from Philippians 4 and Luke 10 and read them again, and again; then I thought about people and things that were true, pure, pleasing, commendable, excellent, and praiseworthy.

Thankfully, when I stop and think about it, it's a pretty long list. The wisdom of Psalm 40:5, is a wonderful reminder of God's countless blessings:

You have multiplied, O Lord my God, your wonderous deeds and your <u>thoughts</u> (my emphasis) toward us; none can compare with you. Were I to proclaim and tell of them they would be more than can be counted.

My early morning exercise was a short-term fix, not a lifelong solution to the challenges of living with a daily diet of distress, all manner of distractions, and unwanted thoughts, but it was a start. I doubt that practice makes perfect, but I believe that good practice leads to good habits that can, over time, impact our experience of daily life and its countless wonders.

After writing out Philippians 4:8 and Luke 10:41-42, I wrote out one other passage from Matthew 7:24-25: In the concluding words of the Sermon on the Mount. Jesus said: *Everyone then who hears these words of mine and acts on them is like a wise man who built his house on rock. The rain fell and the wind blew and beat against that house, but it did not fall, because it was founded on rock.* 

These three passages were daily, life-giving manna for me. The words of Jesus and Paul fortified my heart and my mind for the living of the day. Thankfully, it was joyous, blessed, mostly uneventful and hassle-free day. Thanks to God's grace, I was able to endure the minor, barely noticeable, slings and arrows that came my way and to think about what was pleasing, commendable, and praiseworthy.

We will be on summer break for the months of June, July and August. We will resume study in September. If you have any questions, please reach out to Vivian Waid.




#### MEN'S BIBLE STUDY


## Greetings from your church Council !

The monetary donations allow us to purchase the supplies we need.


We are gathering supplies and funds for backpacks and are looking at a total of \$4000 to fully fund the backpacks for Snoqualmie Valley students. More information will follow

The NW Washington Synod is the congregations, people & ministries of the Pacific Northwest - journeying together.

The Synod Assembly was held on May 18, 2024, at Grace Lutheran Church in Des Moines. It was attended by a total of 337 synod members including 275 voting members, six observers, and 56 visitors/volunteers. We give thanks to our host congregation, to all who assisted in the planning and leadership of the day, and to all the attendees.

The theme was from Psalm 121:1-2 "I lift up my eyes to the hills - from where does my help come? My help comes form the Lord, who made heaven and earth".

We gathered to worship, hear in person and video reports and synod updates, vote on upcoming budget, and to elect members to synod council, committees and the 2025 ELCA Churchwide Assembly.
